

Georgia: Chieftains Trail

DISTANCE: 132 miles TIME: 2 days

Native Americans called this part of Northwest Georgia home for more than 80 centuries. Today, you see evidence of these early inhabitants in place names, ceremonial burial grounds – such as Etowah Indian Mounds – and historic sites including Chief Vann House. Don't miss a stop at New Echota, a National Historic Landmark, where the treaty was signed that sent the Cherokee on their "Trail of Tears." Broad hills and rolling valleys make way for area attractions including Booth Western Art Museum and Chieftains Museum.
